



Did You Know?

Accoutrement and its relative accoutre, a verb meaning "to provide with equipment or furnishings" or "to outfit," have been appearing in English texts since the 16th century. Today both words have variant spellings—accouterment and accouter. Their French ancestor, accoutrer, descends from an Old French word meaning "seam" and ultimately traces to the Latin word consuere, meaning "to sew together." You probably won't be too surprised to learn that consuere is also an ancestor of couture, a word referring to the business of making fashionable clothes, as well as to the clothes themselves.

DID YOU KNOW: Bookworms are actual insects that bore holes in books. A major book feeding insect is a paper louse that feeds on microscopic mould in poorly kept books.

Thank goodness we don't encourage them to feed in our library!



From the Stargazers Club WA: Astrophotography's often refer to this time of the year, from midautumn to mid spring, as the "Milky Way Season"! That's because, during this time of year, we look towards the centre or core of our Milky Way Galaxy. It's dense with stars and stretches across the dark night sky in country WA. Astrophotography's love it!

The Milky Way is best seen when there's no moonlight and you're away from bright city lights. What you're looking for is a band of cloudy or dusty looking light that stretches in an arc from the southeast to the southwest. It looks like a cloud, but it's actually billions of stars that make up the Milky Way Galaxy, our home in the Universe.



SHIRE OF KOJONUP

In early evenings in June, the Milky Way has risen from the southeast and stretches right across the sky to the west. By July, August and September, the core or heart of the Milky Way is high in the southern sky. By October and November, the Milky Way begins to set in the western sky.

When to look: From after sunset on moonless nights

Here are our top picks for early evening times to see the Milky Way:

- From 6:30pm, between 23rd May 3rd June
- From 6pm, between 21st June 3rd July
- From 6:30pm, between 20th July 1st August
- From 7pm, between 19th August 1st September
- From 7:30pm, between 18th September 30th September
- From 8pm, between 18th October 28th October

Which direction to look: Southeast to southwest

For telescopes and binoculars

The Milky Way is an amazing place to point binoculars. As your eyes travel across the stars, you'll find all things amazing and beautiful. It's an awe-inspiring sight and WA is one of the last places on Earth to see the Milky Way in all its glory.

Something interesting

The Milky Way is classified as a spiral galaxy with a central bulge and thin arms stretching over 100,000 light years. Imagine two fried eggs stuck back to back! The centre of our galaxy (the yolks of the eggs) is dense with stars, dust and gas.

When you see that arc of milky-looking light in the southern sky, you are looking through the plane of our galaxy. Imagine you're sitting near the edge of the fried egg and you're looking towards the egg yolks, the centre of the Galaxy. The outer spiral arms (the whites of the eggs) of the Milky Way Galaxy are thinner and contain fewer objects.

From Autumn until Spring, the Earth sits between the centre of the Milky Way and the Sun. At night, the sky is packed full of stars because we're looking towards the centre of the galaxy.

Remember than when planning your next family stargazing night, we have the telescope at the library for our whole community to benefit from.



Kojonup Cemetery Digitization News

While the cemetery software is helping staff (present and future) in managing the cemetery administrations, Chronicle cemetery online maps will give our community and the public access to the cemetery online records.

In the past the process to find information that is specific to certain individuals has been lengthy and sometimes difficult. People had to contact the Shire to gain any extra information, and this can be very time consuming for Shire Team Members. With new Chronicle software, getting information and visiting the grave will be much easier as it will be online, and people will be able to search and instantly access the information they require.

The steps in the process for this project is:

- 1. An aerial survey conducted by surveyors captured the sites by using drone equipment last week.
- 2. The surveyor visits all of the cemeteries he flies to each of the three cemeteries and captures the imagery of Boscabel, Kojonup and Muradup Cemeteries.
- 3. The result of the survey will be processed by the Chronicle team to generate the Orthophoto and use them as the background image for each individual gravesite.

Digitising Process

A digitising process is basically a process of converting the current data provided by the Shire of Kojonup to Chronicle's digital format and be presented on an online platform. Digitising has two main parts: making a GIS feature and records editing. But before Chronicle can go into those steps, they need to review the data the Shire provided them. The Shire of Kojonup has provided Chronicle with survey maps of the cemeteries and Excel records containing the interment entries.


The Shire of Kojonup has done a meticulous job of keeping the records and the maps in the past and we look forward to seeing it accessible by the public.

The key point of both making a GIS feature and records editing is the correlation between a unique number on the map that also exists in the interment records. As soon as Chronicle recognize this correlation exists, they can move on to the first step of the digitising process.

It is expected to be 3-6 months before the Shire of Kojonup can expect to go live.

Everyone will be able to open our online cemetery map (on any device. As long as they have an internet connection), search for their deceased family or loved ones' grave, get the information and read through their stories, and for on-site visits, they can walk to the grave guided by GPS on their mobile device. online



<u>Dog attacks on livestock – Ranger Swain</u>

INTRODUCTION

Every year, sheep, goats and other animals in the Shire of Kojonup die or suffer injury after attacks by wandering domestic dogs. This causes both financial loss and emotional distress to livestock owners. Most attacks can be avoided if owners properly manage their dogs and stop them from wandering. This information sheet outlines what you can do as a dog owner to prevent your dog attacking neighbours' livestock.

DEFINITIONS

The Dog Act 1976 interprets an "attack" to be:

- (a) aggressively rushing at or harassing any person or animal; or
- (b) biting, or otherwise causing physical injury to, a person or animal; or
- (c) tearing clothing on, or otherwise causing damage to the property of, the person attacked; or
- (d) attempting to attack or behaving in such a manner toward a person as would cause a reasonable person to fear injury.

DISPELLING THE MYTHS

All dogs have an instinct to roam and hunt. Many owners believe their dogs are incapable of attacking livestock, but even friendly domestic dogs that would never attack a person will often attack livestock if allowed to wander unsupervised. Packs of wild, savage dogs are rarely responsible. Research shows that in rural areas most attacks involve one or two dogs from small properties nearby.

HOW TO PREVENT YOUR DOG ATTACKING LIVESTOCK

- Fence your dog in, a secure fence will prevent your dog roaming. This eliminates the opportunity for your dog to attack livestock. If necessary, restrain your dog. Dogs can be trained to accept restraint or confinement. However, if restrained a dog must have sufficient exercise during part of the day.
- Don't be careless. Some owners claim their dogs escape despite efforts to restrain them, but this is a
 myth. Most dogs walk out through open gates, under or through insecure fences or over low ones.
 Many dogs that roam is unrestrained on properties without fences, or their owners forget to restrain
 them.
- Take care releasing dogs for exercise. Many owners deliberately release their dogs in the morning for exercise. This is when many attacks occur. The dog may be absent for less than an hour, but this is sufficient time to kill livestock nearby.
- Prevent night-time roaming. Many dogs sleep at the back door and are there in the morning but that doesn't mean the dog has stayed home all night. Dogs often roam after owners have gone to bed and return before they rise. In this time they can attack neighbours' livestock.
- Sterilise your dog. Roaming is normal dog behaviour, particularly in male dogs as they mature. Dogs
 will roam in search of food or bitches on heat, then attack livestock. Roaming may be reduced by
 sterilisation.
- Keep your dog and family safe. Allowing your dog to wander puts its health at risk and can even
 endanger yours. Every year hundreds of pets are shot, poisoned and impounded for attacking
 livestock.
- Be a responsible dog owner. Dogs need more than feeding and watering; they have to be trained, controlled, vaccinated, registered and exercised.



LEGAL FRAMEWORK

In Western Australia, the Dog Act 1976 covers the registration, ownership and control of dogs. The Act states "it is an offence for any dog to attack or chase any person, or any animal owned by, or in the charge of another person, whether or not an injury is caused". As a dog owner, you are legally responsible for your dog's behaviour. In relation to attacks on livestock, the Dog Act 1976 is administered by the Shire, not by the Police.

FINES AND PENALTIES

Dog owners can be fined up to \$10,000 if their dog attacks. Livestock owners are permitted to destroy or capture any dogs they observe attacking livestock on their land, however the setting of baits for dogs is illegal.

BE BRAVE. MAKE CHANGE. NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK 2022

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The dates for NRW are the same each year; 27 May to 3 June.

These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey— the successful <u>1967 referendum</u>, and the <u>High Court Mabo decision</u> respectively.

27 May 1967 On this day, Australia's most successful **referendum** saw more than 90 per cent of Australians vote to give the Australian Government power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and recognise them in the Census.

3 June 1992 On this day, the Australian High Court delivered the Mabo decision, the culmination of Eddie Koiki Mabo's challenge to the legal fiction of 'terra nullius' (land belonging to no one) and leading to the legal recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the Traditional Owners and Custodians of lands. This decision paved the way for Native Title.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

DEFENCE FORCE HELP FOR KOJONUP AGED CARE A

The Australian Defence Force have been sent to a Kojonup aged care facility to cover staff absences.

With staff isolating as a result of COVID-19, up to nine defence force members are working at Springhaven Lodge.

The facility - which houses 22 beds - is owned by the shire and President Ned Radford said the staff are working closely with the staff with a range of jobs including dressing.

"It's a full-on job and not just cleaning...they are in amongst it," Mr Radford said.

Since January the Defence Force has been sent into aged care homes across Australia to help fill staff shortages.

Baptist care WA operates aged care homes across Perth and the Southwest and CEO Russell Bricknell said defence force members sent to their homes were welcomed by residents. "It's a fresh group of people to interact with...it's just a wonderful experience for them (residents)," Mr Bricknell said.



COUNCIL UNANIMOUS ON DECISION TO APPOINT

The Kojonup Shire Council unanimously adopted the motion of Cr. G. H. Watson to appoint an extra Town Ward representative at its meeting on Tuesday.

The appointment of an extra representative has been adopted in principle, subject to the provisions of the Local Government Act.

Speaking on his motion, Town Ward representative Cr. G. H. Watson said it was essential that an extra member be appointed because of the rapidly increasing vol-ume of council business to be handled in the townsite.

An extra townsite Ward member would also give all Wards equal representation on the council.

Cr. D. C. O'Halloran seconded the motion.

Cr. D. C. Pearce asked Cr. Watson when the appointment would be made.

"I would like to see the new member appointed immediately," Cr. Watson said.

Cr. T. H. Merrett said he believed that in the event of the appointment of an extra representative, both the new candidate and the sitting member had to stand for election.

Shire Clerk, M. J. Edmonds said the appointment of an extra representative was an intricate procedure and it was probable that the new member would not be appointed before the elections next year.



EVEN NUMBER

Cr. S. Crook said that if an extra councillor was appointed, there would be an even number on the council, and he questioned whether this complied with the Act.

Cr. T. H. Merrett replied that a precedent had been established and there were a number of shires in W.A. with an even number of councillors.

The motion was then put and carried unanimously.

TOWN FARMERS

Cr. D. C. Pearce asked if it would be possible to have a number of farmers in the Townsite Ward, transferred to other Wards to reduce the size of the Town Ward.

He said there were several farmers paying Town Ward rates on farming land. Shire Clerk, M. J. Ed-monds said it would be better for the council to declare a differential rate for farms within the townsite, rather than change the existing boundaries.

The committee has raised £3,000 towards the cost of the pool and a Government grant of £10,000 is available.

A public opinion poll on the swimming pool is to be held by the Kojonup Shire Council at the end of November.





