



# Special Council Meeting – 1 November 2022 Grant Thompson (CEO)

#### MOONIES HILL ENERGY PTY LTD - REQUEST TO AMEND CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

#### That Council:

1) In accordance with Regulation 77 of the *Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes)*Regulations 2015 approve the amendment of the development approval issued to Moonies Hill Energy
Pty Ltd for the Flat Rocks Wind Farm and issue a revised development approval through the following changes to conditions 4, 21 and 29 and adding advice notes.

In particular, to reword as follows:

#### Condition 4

The wind turbines are to be micro-sited in accordance with the following restrictions —

- a) All wind turbines shall be located a minimum distance of 1 kilometre from any dwelling existing at the time of the issue of this planning approval unless approval in writing is first granted from the owner of that dwelling to a closer location;
- b) The wind turbines shall be located in accordance with the 'Flat Rocks Wind Farm Landscape and Visual Assessment'. This report requires, in order to satisfy visual amenity considerations, either relocation of specified wind turbines or in the alternative, the implementation of vegetation screening.

#### Condition 21

Prior to commencing any works, the Applicant is to lodge a Noise Impact Mitigation Management Plan for approval by the local government. The Noise Impact Mitigation Management Plan is to outline the process by which the Applicant will —

- a) Undertake post-commissioning testing to ensure compliance with condition 29, including testing at existing dwellings, based upon the testing procedures and analysis contained in the South Australian EPA Wind Farms Environmental Noise Guidelines (2021);
- b) Make arrangements with adjoining landowners regarding the construction of dwellings on land;
- c) Modify micro-siting to ensure compliance with condition 29;
- d) Modify the operation of the wind turbines to ensure compliance with condition 29;
- e) Manage complaints regarding noise impact during the operational phase of the development.

#### **Condition 29**

(a) The Applicant shall ensure at all times that the operation of the wind farm complies with the following noise levels within a 30 metre curtilage of a dwelling:



- a) Will not exceed 35dB(A) (LA90, 10 minutes); or
- b) Will not exceed the background noise (LA90, 10 Minutes) by more than 5dB(A), whichever is the greater.
- (b) Assessment of noise impact is to be performed in accordance with SA EPA Wind Farms Environmental Noise Guidelines (2021).

#### Adding advice

Insert new advice notes as follows:

- A) The term 'dwelling' in this approval has the same meaning as the Residential Design Codes Volume 1.
- B) The applicant is advised that:
  - i) There is potential for vacant lots adjacent to the proposed wind farm to be further developed with dwellings.
  - ii) Legislation in Western Australia requires that the wind farm comply with the Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997. The controls on noise contained in this approval do not override those contained in the Regulations, nor vice versa, but the wind farm must comply with whichever control is more stringent at any given location at any given time under then-prevailing meteorological etc conditions.
  - iii) The applicant takes the commercial risk that future wind farm operations may need to be altered or modified to continue to comply with noise limitations.
  - iv) It is recommended that the applicant prepare and submit acoustic compliance reports by a suitably qualified and independent acoustic engineer to demonstrate compliance with Condition 29 at key stages of development. This would provide compliance assurances to both the local government and surrounding landowners.
- 2) Advise the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup of the decision to approve the amendments to the Moonies Hill Energy Pty Ltd wind farm development.

# **Kojonup Main Street Maintenance Works**

#### Works Scheduled for 15 and 16 November 2022

Maintenance works are proposed for the main street of Kojonup (Albany Highway) on 15 and 16 November. These works will require Albany Highway to be reduced to single lane operation to allow the works to be undertaken. Parking spaces on Albany Highway within the work area will be closed to allow for the safe operation of plant and machinery.


The initial section of works will occur at the intersection of George Street and Albany Highway on Tuesday 15 November. The work site will be between McLeod Street and Jones Road. The side roads of Harrison Place, Jones Road and George Street will be closed on the Albany Highway end.

The second section of works will occur at the intersection of Clarke Street and Albany Highway on Wednesday 16 November. The work site will be between Gregory Street and Gordon Street. The side roads of Elverd Street, Clarke Street, Vanzuilecom Street and Spencer Street will be closed on the Albany Highway end.

Further works are expected at other sections of Albany Highway through Kojonup in the coming weeks. Further information will be provided about these works.



# Kambarang - Wildflower season (season of birth) October - November

During the Kambarang season, we see an abundance of colours and flowers exploding all around us. The yellows of many of the Acacias continue to abound, along with some of the Banksias and many other smaller delicate flowering plants including the Kangaroo Paw and Orchids. Also during this time the Balgas will also start to flower, especially if they've been burnt in the past year or closely shaved.

One of the most striking displays of flowers to be seen during this season will be the "Mooja", or Australian Christmas Tree (Nuytsia). The bright orang/yellow flowers serve to signal the heat is on its way.

For the animals, October is also the most likely time of the year that you'll encounter a snake as the reptiles start to awaken from their hibernation and look to make the most of the warm to assist them in getting enough energy to look for food. It's also a time that many young families of birds will be singing out for their parents to feed them. Koolbardies (Magpies) will also be out protecting their nests and their babies.

Many things are undergoing transformation with the warm change in the weather.

Longer dry periods accompany a definite warming trend.

On 3 July 2022 the State Government announced a package of local government reforms including a reduction in the number of Council representatives for many local governments, based on population. The Shire of Kojonup is required to reduce representation from 8 to either 5, 6 or 7 Councillors and to conduct a Representation Review. Reducing the number of elected representatives will not limit the matters that members of the community can raise.

#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

The Shire of Kojonup wishes to remind all landowners and occupiers in the rural district that the Shire's annual aerial fire break inspections will commence on the 13th December 2022.

All properties that fall into the rural firebreak requirements must ensure they are compliant by the 12th December 2022.

Properties outside the gazetted town site must ensure that they meet the following requirements:

(...) have firebreaks at least 20 metres wide, if provided by burning (with a permit), cultivating or spraying, or 60 metres wide if provided by being closely grazed or mowed to the satisfaction of the Shire. The firebreaks are to be in such positions as are necessary to completely surround the perimeter of any homestead building (excluding isolated non-flammable buildings), fuel installation (including drums), haystacks (but only haystacks within 60 metres of any building) or group of such structures or installations. In each case, the outer 3 metres of the firebreak area must be totally free of any inflammable material and where mowing is the method used; all residue of the mowing process must be removed from the area

Any property owners that do not comply with the above requirements may be issued with a penalty of \$250.00 and the Shire may undertake the required work at the property owner's expense.

# FIRE POSITION NOW SATISFACTORY

Kojonup Shire Council is happy with the response to the fire orders recently issued to some farmers and ratepayers in the district.

This was stated at the last meeting of Council after the results of a further inspection by the fire warden had been discussed.

The previous report from the fire warden had recommended prosecution of some district residents for noncompliance with the requirments of the Bush-Fire Act.

On that occasion, Council decided to write to the persons concerned asking them to show cause why they should not be prosecuted.

The Council had received replies from these letters and the inspection showed that where work was necessary it had been carried out in a satisfactory manner.

Councillor D. Tunney told Council that the Shire Clerk, R. L. Leggo should be complimented on his handling of the situation.

"The position is now satisfactory," he said.

It was decided that the persons concerned would be written to again, stating that Council accepted their explanations but pointing out the seriousness of the matter.

# Fire Brigade Training Track Sealed

Sealing of the Kojonup Town Fire Brigade's training track in Pensioner Road has just been completed at a cost of \$1,350.

Tanks and pumps have still to be installed on the track, but all work should be completed and ready for use by the Brigade's 15 members this summer.

The total cost of track construction is being met by the Brigades.

## **Springhaven:**

Good afternoon family and friends of Springhaven, Springhaven Team Members, Shire staff and Council members,

As per the WA Health Chief Health Officer, the state of emergency in WA for COVID19 is declared over.

This means a number of restrictions will be lifted. Below is the current situation at Springhaven Lodge, effective immediately:

- RAT tests will no longer be performed for visitors to Springhaven Lodge
- Staff will continue to RAT test once weekly as a precaution
- Residents will continue to RAT test once weekly as a precaution
- Visitors and staff will continue to wear masks inside the building
- Masks are not required outside
- Visitors are now allowed to eat in communal areas, removing mask to eat and putting mask back on after
- Evidence of vaccination (for both flu and covid) is no longer necessary for visitors to the facility
- Visitors will still have to sign in, on the visitors register, but no questionnaire required
- Enter through the automatic front door (staff to ensure this is turned off in the evening)
- There is no restriction to time or amount of visitors
- Should a resident test positive for COVID, our response will be the same as before and our Outbreak Management Plan will be activated.

COVID is still a very real danger to our vulnerable residents, <u>so visitors are still urged to stay at home if feeling unwell</u> in any way.

# Regional WA's aged care homes capping intake amid ongoing staffing crisis affecting country

Elderly residents of a small WA town may be left travelling hundreds of kilometres for adequate care, in what unions say is a growing problem across regional Australia.

#### **Key points:**

- Regional aged care homes are having to reduce their intake of patients amid ongoing staff shortages
- Kojonup's aged care facility will not take any more new patients
- Kojonup Shire president Edmond Radford says the facility can't run safely without adequate staff

The Shire of Kojonup, 250km south-east of Perth, says its aged care facility, the only major one in the town, will not be able to take on any more patients because of limited staff.

Residents requiring more advanced care may need to remain at home, lean on local hospitals or relocate to Perth or Albany 150km further south.

Shire President Edmond Radford said it was a decision that had to be made to ensure the facility could be run safely.

"It's too much of a risk to have new patients because of our staff shortage," he said.

Cr Radford said Springhaven Lodge had 22 permanent beds but could only accommodate 16 residents to operate safely. He said the facility immediately needed an additional five staff and a registered nurse to operate at full capacity.

Its current and only registered nurse is set to depart, and a replacement has been nearly impossible to find.

"We're in a very serious position where we were not capable of finding another one," Cr Radford said.

"There's no light at the end of the tunnel for us."

"It really has gotten beyond the local government to try and sort the problem."

#### Limited options for elderly

The crisis is not limited to Kojonup, with both the Shire and the union representing aged care workers pointing to similar situations in other towns.

United Workers Union's aged care director Carolyn Smith said older Australians in regional towns were being left with limited options when it came to support.

Ms Smith said some people would be forced to stay at home, which was unsafe, and others might need to go to hospital.

She said a lot of people would also need to relocate to larger cities and towns to get the support they required.



"That is really tough on that older person," Ms Smith said.

#### "It takes them away from their community and their family."

"When they're forced to go to a bigger town or city for residential care, you really lose the heart of a country town."

While staffing shortages in the aged care sector are being felt across the country, attracting and retaining a skilled aged care workforce in regional and rural areas is challenging, Ms Smith says.


She said traditionally, the aged care workforce had been made up of migrants and international students.

"They are often populations we don't see in country towns," Ms Smith said.

"The problems of staffing aged care facilities get harder the further you are away from bigger cities.

"It's a real problem for the families and for the older Australians who are impacted."

In collaboration with the City of Albany and the shires of Broomehill-Tambellup, Cranbrook, Denmark, Gnowangerup, Jerramungup, Katanning, Kent, Kojonup, Plantagenet and Woodanilling, the Department of Transport is developing the Great Southern 2050 Cycling Strategy.

The Strategy will set out a long-term vision for bike riding across the region, including an aspirational cycling network with proposed infrastructure covering key townsites and providing interregional connections.

When complete, the Strategy will be used to guide funding decisions and prioritise key bike riding projects.

#### The Draft Cycling Network

This information sheet includes maps illustrating the draft cycling network for Kojonup, and the regional hinterland surrounding the Shire.

# The draft network has been built to help achieve the following themes:

- Connecting people to where they live, work, learn and play;
- Encouraging cycling for people of all ages, abilities and backgrounds;
- > Improving planning for cycling:
- Developing unique cycle tourism experiences, including inter-regional cycle tourism routes along rail corridors;
- > Improving safety for road cyclists; and
- → Developing safe cycle routes in town centres

# Some of the key features of the draft network include:

- Potential rail trail from Kojonup to Katanning and Nyabing;
- → Potential cycle trails to Farrer Reserve and Myrtle Benn Reserve;
- Connecting regional towns via rail and road reserves; and
- Safer links to schools, shops and recreational facilities.

#### About the Cycling Network Hierarchy

On the following maps you will see routes classified by the Western Australian Cycling Network Hierarchy. The WA Cycling Network Hierarchy identifies routes by their function, depending on the type of activities that take place on the route and not on their built form.

The route hierarchy includes:

- > Primary Routes
- Secondary Routes
- → Local Routes
- → Road Cycling Routes
- → Tourist / Transport Trails

Except for Road Cycling Routes, all levels of the hierarchy are designed to cater for bicycle riders of all ages and abilities.

#### The Red Poppy

Worn on Remembrance Day (11 November) each year, the red poppies were among the first to flower in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium in the First World War. In soldiers' folklore, the vivid red of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground.

In England in 1919, the British Legion sought an emblem that would honour the dead and help the living. The Red Poppy was adopted as that emblem and since then has been accepted as the Emblem of Remembrance.

#### Who's going to be using our telescope?....Hopefully Your Family??

A Total Eclipse of the Moon! Did you see this on the 8<sup>th</sup> November, it was too cloudy from my viewing point!

For natural cosmic phenomena, you don't get more remarkable than a Total Lunar Eclipse! A total lunar eclipse occurs, when the Sun and Moon are perfectly aligned in their orbits, with the Earth in the middle. As the Moon travels around the far side of the Earth, it passes directly into the shadow of the Earth.


#### Why does the Moon turn Red?

To add to the magic of it all, the Moon turns a coppery-red during a total eclipse, earning it the nickname

of 'Blood Moon'. As the Moon passes into the full shadow of the Earth, called the umbra, the Sun's light passes through the atmosphere of our planet and is scattered, losing most of the blue light. This means that the light that reaches the lunar surface is predominantly red in colour. This effect is known as Rayleigh Scattering and this is also how our sunsets are created.

Morning tea is provided.


















#### I have been very interested in being part of a Book Club.....
