Dealing with snakes

In spring and summer, many reptiles emerge to bask in the sun. During this time you should take precautions to minimise the chance of encountering snakes.

Remember, snakes are an integral part of the natural environment and play an important role in wildlife ecosystems.

Common snakes around

Dangerously venomous dugites and tiger snakes are common in WA. Both species hunt small mammals, frogs and lizards, and are active during the day and at night in warm weather.

- Tiger snakes (*Notechis scutatus*) are most common in vegetation around wetland areas but may be found well away from water. They are seen throughout the year sunning themselves in open areas.
- Dugites (*Pseudonaja affinis*) are most common in the drier bushland areas around Perth, especially grasslands. These fast-moving snakes are attracted to aviaries and other locations where mice can be found.

Precautions

- Take care in bushland and grassy areas.
- Walk and/or cycle in cleared areas only, where you can see the ground.
- When bushwalking, wear long trousers and boots or other enclosed footwear that preferably cover the ankles.
- Keep a watchful eye on the ground about a metre ahead of where you are walking, and avoid entering areas of long grass, rushes and undergrowth.
- Around your home remove long grass and items lying on the ground such as corrugated iron,
 which may provide cover for snakes.
- Reduce mice numbers around the house.



If you find a snake

Do not approach or aggravate it in any way. Most bites occur when people accidentally step on snakes, or while attempting to kill them. As the warmer days of spring approach, snakes become more active as they leave their winter retreats in search of a mate and food.

If you find a snake in your house, follow the advice above and search online for a snake removal service near you.

ENEL GREEN POWER AUSTRALIA **PTY LTD – A**ssessment of Development layout plan and management plans relating to conditions 4, 17 & 21 and easement for access to portions of certain road reserves

That:

- 1) Council approves the Development Layout Plan (Condition 17) for the Flat Rocks Wind Farm as reproduced in Attachment 9.4.2.2.
- 2) The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Shire President are granted authority to execute, to apply the Shire of Kojonup's (Shire) common seal to the Agreement for Installation (Attachment 9.4.2.4) to enable the proponent to have access to portions of road reserves for infrastructure approved by the Development Layout Plan, and to enable the Shire (in the Shire's capacity as manager of the road reserve) to approve and have a record of the engineering details of the infrastructure approved of or contemplated by the DLP in the affected road reserves. This authority is subject to the CEO being satisfied that the intended easement locations provided for in the Agreement match with the DLP locations, and being satisfied with the technical details of the drawings for the cabling.
- 3) The CEO is granted authority to confirm the Shire's approval of the Noise Impact Mitigation Management Plan, provided the proponent first causes the version Rp 001 R01 20220108 dated 28.10.22 (Attachment 9.4.2.3), to be amended in the second-last sub-paragraph of 3.0 so as to state:
 - 'In the event that background noise monitoring is carried out in the future, the results of this monitoring would be used for determining wind speed dependent noise limits in accordance with Condition 29, subject to their inclusion in an updated version of this NIMMP requiring approval by the Shire's Chief Executive Officer.'
- 4) Council notes that it is Council's understanding that any future noise monitoring for the purpose of establishing background noise should be undertaken without the turbines in operation.
- 5) Council further notes that approval of the Development Layout Plan and management plans does not override the need to obtain any relevant approvals that may be separately required from other agencies.
- 6) The CEO advises the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup of this decision.

Review of Representation

(Number of Council Representatives)

On 3 July 2022 the State Government announced a package of local government reforms including a reduction in the number of Council representatives for many local governments, based on population. The Shire of Kojonup is required to reduce representation from 8 to either 5, 6 or 7 Councillors and to conduct a Representation Review. Reducing the number of elected representatives will not limit the matters that members of the community can raise.

Public submissions are invited as to the number of Council representatives the Community of Kojonup would prefer

(either 5, 6, or 7)

An information sheet* is available detailing the different representative to electors and population ratios for 5, 6 or 7 councillors for the Shire of Kojonup. WA is the cream of the crop when it comes to farming, but paddock fires pose a huge risk in rural communities once grain crops start to ripen.

Ahead of today's elevated Fire Danger Ratings in the Wheatbelt, two helitaks and two fixed-wing waterbombers were forward deployed to Northam and Cunderdin. The aircraft are accompanied by highly trained aerial firefighting crews that include three pilots, reloader staff, refuellers and DFES career firefighters as air attack supervisors.

As part of our Harvest Aerial Protection Program, we also have aircraft and crews currently based in Geraldton, protecting our northern farmers as they harvest. These planes will later move to southern communities as grain gathering activities increase.



Springhaven:

Good afternoon family and friends of Springhaven, Springhaven Team Members, Shire staff and Council members,

As per the WA Health Chief Health Officer, the state of emergency in WA for COVID19 is declared over.

This means a number of restrictions will be lifted. Below is the current situation at Springhaven Lodge, effective immediately:

- RAT tests will no longer be performed for visitors to Springhaven Lodge
- Staff will continue to RAT test once weekly as a precaution
- Residents will continue to RAT test once weekly as a precaution
- Visitors and staff will continue to wear masks inside the building
- Masks are not required outside
- Visitors are now allowed to eat in communal areas, removing mask to eat and putting mask back on after
- Evidence of vaccination (for both flu and covid) is no longer necessary for visitors to the facility
- Visitors will still have to sign in, on the visitors register, but no questionnaire required
- Enter through the automatic front door (staff to ensure this is turned off in the evening)
- There is no restriction to time or amount of visitors
- Should a resident test positive for COVID, our response will be the same as before and our Outbreak Management Plan will be activated.

COVID is still a very real danger to our vulnerable residents, <u>so visitors are still urged to stay at home if feeling unwell</u> in any way.

About the project

In collaboration with the City of Albany and the shires of Broomehill-Tambellup, Cranbrook, Denmark, Gnowangerup, Jerramungup, Katanning, Kent, Kojonup, Plantagenet and Woodanilling, the Department of Transport is developing the Great Southern 2050 Cycling Strategy.

The Strategy will set out a long-term vision for bike riding across the region, including an aspirational cycling network with proposed infrastructure covering key townsites and providing interregional connections.

When complete, the Strategy will be used to guide funding decisions and prioritise key bike riding projects.

To help us develop the strategy, we want to know:

- what your local bike riding needs are;
- what issues need to be addressed; and
- what opportunities you see to make riding safer, more enjoyable and convenient.

The Draft Cycling Network

This information sheet includes maps illustrating the draft cycling network for Kojonup, and the regional hinterland surrounding the Shire.

The draft network has been built to help achieve the following themes:

- Connecting people to where they live, work, learn and play;
- Encouraging cycling for people of all ages, abilities and backgrounds;
- > Improving planning for cycling:
- Developing unique cycle tourism experiences, including inter-regional cycle tourism routes along rail corridors;
- > Improving safety for road cyclists; and
- → Developing safe cycle routes in town centres

Some of the key features of the draft network include:

- Potential rail trail from Kojonup to Katanning and Nyabing;
- → Potential cycle trails to Farrer Reserve and Myrtle Benn Reserve;
- Connecting regional towns via rail and road reserves; and
- Safer links to schools, shops and recreational facilities.

About the Cycling Network Hierarchy

On the following maps you will see routes classified by the Western Australian Cycling Network Hierarchy. The WA Cycling Network Hierarchy identifies routes by their function, depending on the type of activities that take place on the route and not on their built form.

The route hierarchy includes:

- > Primary Routes
- Secondary Routes
- → Local Routes
- → Road Cycling Routes
- → Tourist / Transport Trails

Except for Road Cycling Routes, all levels of the hierarchy are designed to cater for bicycle riders of all ages and abilities.

Although Cassius life has been cut short at only 15 years old, his mother Mechelle Turvey believes he has left behind an 'amazing' and enduring legacy in uniting people who believe that all 'All Kids Matter' and plans to use the money raised from the funding page set up in his memory will be used to develop a community initiative to help vulnerable and disadvantaged children.
