

Staffing

CEO Review - 2018/19

That the CEO Performance Review undertaken by Elected Members on 20 August 2019 endorse the following outcomes and actions: -

- 4. That Council formally records that the CEO is not seeking an extension to his employment contract term which expires 22 July 2021.



- 5. That Council via a separate agenda item will deal with the disposal of KO 629 (2017 Holden Caprice) to the CEO in accordance with Regulation 30 (3) (a) & (b) of the Local Government (Function and General) Regulations 1996, which reads as follows:

- (b) The entire consideration received by the local government for the disposition is used to purchase other property, and where the total consideration for the other property is not more, or worth more, than \$75 000. 6. Funding for Leadership Development

A pool of scholarships of up to \$4,000 per person are currently available to support participation in a practical and targeted leadership development course. Executive Ready is a seven month leadership and career accelerator designed to stretch managers and propel them towards executive level performance, behaviours and mindsets. The program challenges participants to see themselves, their responsibilities and their opportunities with fresh eyes. **Deadline closes 13 September**.

Men as Role Models for Preventing Violence against Women and their Children

Organisations are invited to apply for funding to deliver innovative primary prevention activities that involve men as positive role models to drive changes in the behaviours and attitudes that contribute to violence against women and children. **Deadline: closes 24 September**.

Community Gardens Grants Program

Community gardening provides an opportunity for people to come together and develop a greater understanding between neighbours and community members. Getting involved can help people to improve community connections, develop new skills and share physical, social and mutual benefits of growing edible produce and enable community members to:

- participate more actively in community life;
- connect with the environment and others in the community;
- develop and implement skills; and
- give back to the community.

Organisations can request up to \$10,000 per project however conditions apply as organisations are encouraged to seek assistance for garden infrastructure and minor capital equipment from other funding sources prior to applying to this program. **Deadline: Closes 3 October 2019**

James is getting on a bit and needs full-time help. So Phoebe and Robert, his middle-aged offspring, employ Mandy, who seems willing to take him off their hands. But as James regales his family with tales of Mandy's virtues, their shopping trips, and the shared pleasure of their journeys to garden centres, Phoebe and Robert sense something is amiss. Is this really their father, the distant figure who never once turned up for a sports day, now happily chortling over cuckoo clocks and television soaps? Then something happens that throws everything into new relief, and Phoebe and Robert discover that life most definitely does not stop for the elderly. It just moves onto a very different plane - changing all the stories they thought they knew so well.



After relocating to South Africa on the heels of scandal five years ago, Chloe and her invalid father, Mike, once wealthy Zimbabwean landowners, now have little. Away at university, Chloe has had to rely on her father's best friend Enoch and his son Xo to watch over Mike.

When a violent confrontation puts Chloe in danger, Enoch steps in to help — with inadvertent fatal results. With increasing pressure from a right—wing group on the police to charge Enoch, this mismatched family have no choice but to flee back to Zimbabwe.

But crossing the border will be dangerous and near impossible with their route taking them amid warring dissident armies and landmines, and their every footstep is stalked by a shadowy ring of hunters – whose trophies are taken from more than animals...



Only with help from Nick, formerly a soldier under Mike's command, now a professional game ranger, will the fugitives have a chance of making it home. But Nick has long struggled to come to terms with his fellow soldiers' choices before their unit was abandoned. Will his past demons put them all at risk?

NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Is saying 'Using the Tip costs too much' an excuse for dumping rubbish?

These are some of the disturbing images taken at Myrtle Benn Flora and Fauna Sanctuary last week as some community members dump their household rubbish in the bush.





Warren Blackwood Waste services Kojonup and surrounding towns and work hard to keep fees low for the use of the Recycle Transfer Station. Disposal of uncontaminated **green waste is free**, while a trailer load of general waste is from \$10-20. Council has budgeted for a hard waste roadside pickup which will be conducted before the Christmas period. Keep an eye out for more information.

Seven Reasons to Dispose Of Your Rubbish Properly:

1. Soil contamination

Soil contamination is the No. 1 problem caused by improper waste removal and disposal. Take the case of plastic bottles. When they eventually break down, they release DEHA, a carcinogen that affects our reproduction systems, causes liver dysfunction, and weight loss. Soil contamination does not only affect plant growth, it is also unhealthy to humans and animals feeding on those plants.

2. Air contamination

Waste that contains hazardous chemicals, such as bleach and acids, needs to be disposed of properly, and only in approved containers with correct labels.

3. Water contamination

Hazardous wastes in the environment leech into the ground, and ultimately, into ground water. This water is used for many things, from watering gardens to drinking. Toxic liquid chemicals from waste can also seep into water streams and bodies of water.

4. Bad impact on human health

Improper disposal of waste can greatly affect the health of the population living nearby the polluted area. Improperly handled wastes can cause skin irritations, blood infections, respiratory problems, growth problems, and even reproductive issues.

5. Impact on animals and marine life

Animals who consume grasses near contaminated areas are also risk of poisoning due to the toxins that seep into the soil.

6. Disease-carrying pests

Mosquitoes breed in cans and tires that collect water, and can carry diseases such as malaria and dengue. Rats find food and shelter in rubbish, and they can carry diseases such as leptospirosis and salmonellosis. Moreover, moisture production from waste is a breeding ground for mould. It's bacteria that has the ability to spread and grow given the appropriate conditions, such as moisture production from appliances and food scraps.

7. Adversely affect the local economy

Everyone wants to stay and live in a healthy, clean, fresh, and sanitary place. A town with poor waste management will certainly not attract tourists or investors.

Foxes here we come!



Landowners from across 11 Shires are joining together to reduce fox numbers on their properties.

This collaborative project is funded by the Australian Government through the 'Communities Combating Pest and Weed Impacts during Drought Program – Biosecurity Management of Pests and Weeds'. Shire of Kent NRM officer, Paul Leoni, is leading the project which includes the Shires of Lake Grace, Kent, Jerramungup, Gnowangerup, Plantagenet, Cranbrook, Broomehill-Tambellup, Kojonup, Katanning, Woodanilling and Wagin.

The project proposes to implement three periods of regional fox baiting between ~Jan-2020 to ~Jun-2021 at strategically selected sheep farm properties (and adjacent buffer areas) across a ~11.5 Shire single continuous block in the Great Southern of WA, for the purpose of reducing potential fox

predation impacts on the local sheep industry. Local organisations have been designated to each Shire/s to facilitate implementation of fox baiting interventions. This proposal will demonstrate the logistical efficiencies of collaborating a fox baiting program at a regional scale.

Funding requested will support:

- The selection of strategically located sheep farms (and their buffer areas) within each Shire;
- Landholders of selected farms to acquire their 1080 accreditation and 1080 permits.
- Contracting of pest control experts, who will provide and distribute 1080 (and other) fox baits for use at the selected sheep farms; and
- Collection of results of baiting activities and reporting.

Feral cats now declared pests in WA

The State Government has strengthened measures to protect native Western Australian wildlife from feral cats by declaring them a pest animal under the Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007 (BAM Act).



The declaration supports native wildlife management programs, like those conducted by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, within State reserves and other areas of high conservation.

It also allows local conservation groups and other organisations to receive funding to carry out control and management programs to effectively and humanely manage feral cats.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) administers the BAM Act and prepared the legislative amendments needed for feral cats to be declared pest animals.

Management and control of feral cats is undertaken by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions.



Some of the recognised control methods for feral cats include exclusion fencing, baiting, trapping using cage traps, and shooting. All control methods must be humane, and comply with the Animal Welfare Act 2002.

Feral cats are those that are living and reproducing in the wild. They are not socialised and survive on their own in the wild by hunting.

Feral cats are a major threat to WA's unique biodiversity and native fauna. In Western Australian, there are presently 36 mammals, 22 birds and 11 reptile species vulnerable to predation by feral cats.

Australia-wide, the pest cats have played a major role in the extinction of at least 27 mammal species. Predation by feral cats is recognised as a key threatening process under the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999.

At-risk wildlife in Western Australia include the western ground parrot, Gilbert's potoroo, northern quoll, western quoll or chuditch, numbat, quokka, and bilby.

While feral cats are the same species as domestic cats, they are extremely different in how and where they live. Only feral cats will be targeted by programs under the pest animal declaration, not stray or domestic cats, and mainly in reserves and areas that are away from urban areas.

It is important that domestic pet cat owners comply with the Cat Act 2011, which requires all pet cats be sterilised, microchipped, and registered by the time they're six months old, and any requirements and curfews imposed by the local government.
